

To all these members thank you for the time and the work that you gave so willingly. To the parents of the juniors who helped organise them and raise money for equipment, especially Mrs. M. Phillips (junior committee secretary), Mr. Mike Kennedy, Mr. Wawra, Mr. A. Stewart and the ladies who scored for these teams, the Committee thank you for all your efforts and sincerely appreciate your participation and involvement.

We had a fairly successfull year with one U/13 team playing in the grand final, an U'17 premiership as well as runners up in the Coca-Cola Championship, Division 3 South premiers, Division 2 Reserves premiership, Division 2 runners up and the V.B.A. Division 2 Club Championship. Congratulations to the players in all the teams. I thank my committee for the work and time that they gave the Club during the year.

While not wishing to pick out individual members I must thank Allan Burdett for his money raising efforts in particular and his support at all times, also to Secretary Trevor (Rivet) Martin who has given this Club as much as anyone can give in time and effort. He is always there when needed and willing to do whatever is asked of him.

It has been a great pleasure to me to have him as Secretary and I thank him for his help.

What would we do without our Ladies Committee? They organise social functions, run the canteen, raise money and support the Club and we can't thank them enough for all their work and time given so willingly.

There are a great many others who help in many ways also and to them we record our thanks, particularly to the men who have helped umpire games in the juniors and seniors.

We are fast approaching another season and must ask ourselves whether we can do better than last year.

We must improve on our money raising efforts as costs have risen, V.B.A. expenses will be higher and our coaches must receive a better remuneration for their expenses.

We have in this Club some of the best coaches in Victoria and a lot of players just take it for granted that they will give their time and knowledge for nothing.

I've got news for the players who think like this. Our coaches each year recieve offers from other Clubs far in excess of what they receive at Cheltenham, but they stay on to help you, but you do not always give them 100% effort. This must change or we will not get anywhere. At this stage I would envisage at least three training nights a week for senior teams and they would be complusory, not one night as many put in last year.

You may be interested to know that only one player had 100%

attendance at training last year. Next year we need everyone to train each training night or we are not going to make it.

Some players seem to think that it is not necessary to pay their fees as soon as possible as they will still get a game. You may be in for a shock.

The Committee has to meet its commitments so why don't you meet yours.

Fees will probably have to be increased, by how much we don't know a this time, but it could be substantial if we do not get better attendances at the social functions than we did last year. Many seem to foreget that if is for your benefit that these functions are held and the more money raised the lower your fees will be. Think about it, and while doing this ask yourself how you can make Cheltenham Baseball Club better than it its.

I was very fortunate to have the support of a very experienced and dedicated panel of coaches in Alan Tanner, Ian Harris and Kevin Williams. These men did an outstanding job. No coach could ask for more support than I received from them and Len LePage's committee.

Home and Away Games

All three senior sides finished on the top of their respective ladders with exceptional percentages. The Club Championship was an appropriate reward to the players who have stuck with the club at a difficult time. Baseball history is littered with lesser clubs who have fallen apart under similar circumstances.

Young Players

From a coaching view point, attitude and improvement are the best rewards and the number of young players who were able to assume many roles this year augurs well for the future. These players gained visibly in confidence as the teams began to win regularly. This "winning feeling" was an important factor in our success as the pennant drives gained momentum.

Selection

Forty - four players were tried in the senior nines including seventeen in the firsts. The strong competition for places in the starting nines caused the "dead wood" to fade out of contention and drop by the wayside. This healthy competition is essential in a strong club and the selfish or faint hearted have no right to be there in the first place.

A special commendation to those players who often played in unfamiliar positions or in lower grades to allow balanced team selections or to permit promising younger players a chance to play at a high level. It is these players that constitute the backbone and spirit of the club.

It was also selection policy to qualify marginal players for as many teams as possible to cover injury and team balance problems. This worked successfully and will be followed again next year. The club is always greater than the individual.

Defence

In terms of the fewest runs scored against, the club lead in all grades indicating a general stiffening of our defences and

more effective batteries against the weaker opposition. There still remains a great deal of work to be done in this area and this wlll be the top priority next season.

Offence

A combination of more intensive hitting practice and the weaker opposition saw the club score nearly 800 runs and exceptional batting performances in all teams.

Disciplined situation hitting and more intelligent base running, however remain high on the list of priorities for next season.

Practice

Wednesday night attendances ranged between 24 - 31 players and were successful general practices.

Mondays were less successful with only 15 - 18 players appearing regularly.

The policy next season will be for two regular nights per week building to at least three leading up to the finals.

In conclusion

Our future is in our own hands, there is sufficient talent in the club around which a strong team can be built but it will require a great deal more effort and individual sacrifice than most players have been prepared to give in the past.

Complete mastery of the fundamentals should be every player's primary objective and this requires long hours of practice and the acceptance of constructive suggestions in conjunction with a realistic appraisal of one's own abilities.

With the prospect of a new ground and first class facilities just around the corner the club now has the opportunity to continue to improve its playing skills to a level where we are once again competitive with Division 1 clubs.

The team finished the home and away games on top of the ladder and easily accounted for Bonbeach (9-0) and Port Melbourne (13-2) in the finals. Phil Bibby's pitching in those games over powered the opposition.

Moorabbin, on the other hand proved a different proposition altogether and the team suffered a 5-1 loss in the semi-final and a 27-13 humiliation in the grand final after leading 9-7 into the eighth innings. This grand final defeat should never be forgotten and should in itself be sufficient incentive to motivate all players to give a maximum effort next season. These games demonstrated the crucial team aspect of baseball. The physical discipline and mental toughness needed to execute fundamental plays were noticeably absent in many situations. Grand final wins only come to teams which play and train together until a co-ordinated reaction to any situation becomes automatic. Natural ability is not sufficient to overcome a determined and talented opposition under the pressures encountered in finals.

The statistics show that most players had successful years - some their best ever - but special mention must be made of the invaluable contribution the two new recruits, Ian Brown and David Corby made to the club.

Very special thanks also to our scorer and statistician, Elizabeth Landry for another top class job.

The third nine started the season with a goal of making the finals for the first time in any of the current players memory.

To not only have achieved that, but to have won the premiership is a credit to the players who formed the side during the year. As they always play on opposite grounds to the first nine, the thirds have generally received little credit for their performances but, 1980 - 81 proved that given support from the selection table the sides level of dedication and desire to succeed was equal, if not stronger, than the senior teams.

Firstly the same training rules applied ie. no practice - no play, and the enforcement of this helped develop the right mental attitude to the game.

Secondly players also realized competition for places in the side encourages better performances.

At the end of the home and away games, Chelt had achieved their initial aim with 22 wins from 24 games, the last 12 in succession. The two defeats of the first round were avenged later in the year, and Chelt finished $4\frac{1}{2}$ games ahead of its nearest rival.

Three fighting wins with undermanned sides prior to the finals had instilled the belief in all players that a Chelt side had the ability and determination to end the season with the flag.

Obviously the new goal could only be a premiership. The finals could only be described as classics.

The semi-final found Chelt trailing 4-0 in the seventh against a confident Upwey. Chelt rallied and won 8-4.

It was again Upwey who suffered in the Grand Final but this time Chelt's comeback was nothing less than sensational. Cheltenham after trailing 1-10 were rewarded for all the hours of dedication at practice when they refused to accept defeat and over ran Upwey to win 21-11.

Perhaps the highest praise of Chelt came from the Upwey coach and players who in a fine sporting gesture praised the Chelt players

discipline and competitive spirit.

Apart from winning the flag, 1981 proved to 12 baseballers just what can be achieved through good hard effort and its discipline which can be followed on and off the baseball field.

JUNIOR REPORT 1980 - 81

The club increased the number of junior teams to four with an extra Under 13 side comprising boys from the Highett State School. Over 25 new players were instroduced to the game and while this restricted the development of the more experienced players the increased numbers were essential and there is no doubt that the club is moving in the right direction.

An attempt was made to establish a four team Tuesday night competition prior to Christmas but the limitation of space and the general inexperience of the boys themselves saw the competition suspended and the efforts directed to more fundamental coaching. There is now a strong nucleus of talented and experienced players who now require preferential treatment in the form of advanced coaching and it will be necessary to expand the junior coaching panel to accelerate their improvement.

Overall the juniors performed exceptionally well and for the first time in many years the club has at least 10 players with the ability to go onto Division 1 and possibly State Baseball.

The premiership to the Under 17's lead by Mick Trevorah was particularly satisfying because they defeated the strong Waverley side which has dominated that age group for the past five years and even though they lost to Waverley in the Coca-Cola Championship in post-season play, they proved they were marginally superior by defeating them three out of five over the whole season.

The Under 13 Rustlers also played Waverley in the Grand Final but lost to a very strong side in spite of a 4 hitter thrown by Anthony Kennedy.

Thanks to all the parents who provided assistance and expecially Maureen Phillips, Gerry Wawra and of course Graeme Ainscough who had the very difficult job of managing the inexperienced and very young Steers.

Peter Burdett in his first year as manager of Under 15's did a fine job and his team was a credit to the club, although it found the opposition pretty tough (and big) at times.

Thanks to Steve Bott, Greg Talbett, Kel Roberts, Charlie Siddel and the other umpires and to Kevin Williams for the diamond marking.

With the move to the new ground now imminent, the club now needs to gear up to further expansion to a scale comparable to other major clubs.


